Seeking Graduate Research Assistants

The Research Collaborative on Higher Education in Prison at the University of Utah is recruiting prospective graduate research assistants. Eligible applicants need to be accepted to the PhD program in the Department of Educational Leadership and Policy with a focus on Higher Education. The PhD in Educational Leadership and Policy trains students to become scholars and researchers.

Graduate students with the Research Collaborative work as research assistants for 20 hours per week with the following benefits:

- Annual stipend of \$35,000
- 12 credits of tuition for fall & spring semesters; 6 credits for summer
- Payment of health insurance premium
- A laptop for use while in the program

How to Email a Faculty Member to Ask to Do Research With Them

Step 1: Want to do research. **Step 2:** Find a topic you're interested in. **Step 3:** Find a faculty member who does research on said topic. **Step 4:** Open up your email and prepare to email them. **Step 5:** Have a self-induced anxiety attack, close your computer, throw it at a wall, move to another country, start another life as an alpaca farmer.

Okay so maybe I exaggerated that last step just a bit. But it's perfectly natural to feel anxious emailing faculty! So here's a template (see next page) you can use that might make things a little easier. And just remember, most faculty will be excited that you took an interest in working with them and will be happy to either work with you or help you get connected to someone else.

Although this is just a template, you can tweak and modify it in any way that makes sense for you. The key is to be clear about what you are looking for out of the potential collaboration/relationship. For example, are you looking to learn more about formulating a research question? Working with quantitative or qualitative data? Navigating the publication process? Being clear about your goals in your initial outreach will help you stand out in a sea of emails. Finally, keep in mind that many faculty get dozens, if not hundreds of emails a day. If you email them and don't hear back within a week or so, don't be afraid to reach back out or try emailing someone else instead.

Be brave, click send, and enjoy! You got this!


